Fairfield FYI, A New Resident App, Available SOON!

Have you heard about the new app from the City? The City of Fairfield will soon launch a new app called **Fairfield FYI** which is designed to allow Fairfield residents to quickly and easily request assistance for City services or report non-emergency issues from their smartphones or other mobile devices. The goal of the app is to build a stronger relationship with residents and amplify the resident focused service model all City departments strive to uphold.



How does it work? The home screen of the Fairfield FYI application (as seen to the left) acts as a one-stop shop for all of your contact needs. Each icon will automatically direct you to a website or service provider. The orange plus sign at the bottom provides access to a resident communication system for issues and requests.

To report an issue or make a request, it's just three easy steps:

1. Upload or take a picture in the app
2. Choose the location associated with the issue or request
3. Provide details related to the issue or request

By downloading Fairfield FYI, residents not only have the resources they want but they are also opening a two-way conversation with the City. The City can provide notices and updates regarding specific issues or location specific concerns, such as leaf collection or street closures, in addition to prompt attention to the requests submitted.

The Fairfield FYI app will be available and free to download on mobile devices in Google Play and the Apple App Store.

Keep Grass Clippings Out of the Street

As you continue to mow your lawn this summer, the City of Fairfield reminds you to keep your grass clippings on your lawn and out of the street. Blowing grass clippings into the street is a property maintenance code violation.



The City has adopted these regulations for several reasons.

Grass clippings can clog storm sewers and drywells, will negatively impact local streams and waterways, are dangerous to motorists and bicyclists, makes your property appear unkempt, and may harm property values.

Please try to avoid this violation by properly bagging and disposing or by sweeping your clippings back into your yard where they will naturally compost.

Salon Suites of Fairfield Opens

A new concept salon has opened at 726 Nilles Road adjacent to Heirloom Framing and Servatii Pastry Shop. Partnership Results in Fairfield Logistics Park

A new speculative industrial park is coming to Seward Road thanks to a partnership between the City of Fairfield and Fairfield Township. The development will be located on a 146-acre site south of the United Dairy Farmers at Seward and Tylersville Roads. The property is located within Fairfield Township, but served by Seward Road, which is a City-owned street.

The City and Township are collaborating to create a Joint Economic Development District (JEDD) which will allow for the City's income tax to be collected at the project site. This revenue will be shared between both governmental entities to provide services to the property in the future, and to support road improvements to serve the development. Several roadway improvements are planned, including widening and straightening Seward Road, and improving the intersection of Seward and Tylersville Roads.

The project will result in the construction of 850,000 to 1.4 million square feet of industrial space on what is currently unbuildable flood zone land. The project is estimated to create 425 to 725 new jobs. The City will benefit from new revenues and upgrades to City-owned roadways. The Fairfield City School District also stands to benefit from increased property tax revenue.



InnoMark Makes Energy Upgrades



A long-time Fairfield business, InnoMark Communications, is improving the energy efficiency of its manufacturing facility using PACE financing, a new program available in the City. InnoMark, located at 420 Distribution Circle, produces retail displays, packaging, and related products for many high-profile brand names. While replacing the roof on its 150,000 square foot facility, the company is taking the opportunity to upgrade the R-value of the roof insulation. Additionally, the company will replace its aging rooftop HVAC units with modern, high efficiency units. These improvements represent an \$800,000 investment.

PACE, which stands for Property Assessed Clean Energy, allows the company to finance the improvements through a special tax assessment collected on the real estate. To advance the project and facilitate other PACE projects in Fairfield, the City recently joined the I-75 Energy Special Improvement District, which also includes the City of Monroe and Liberty Township. Door-to-Door Sales Scam Prevention Tips:

The doorbell rings, you answer and, by doing so, unknowingly walk into a sales pitch.

Every homeowner knows what it is like to deal with a door-to-door salesperson. With a City Solicitor's Permit, solicitors may legally go door to door in Fairfield between certain hours depending on the time of year (<https://www.fairfield-city.org/499/Solicitor-Permits>). While typically these solicitors are innocuous and play by the rules, some people will pose as legitimate solicitors in order to scam, take advantage of, or do harm to residents.

Before working with a solicitor, be aware of these safety tips from the Fairfield Police Department. Scammers will usually target the elderly, typically offering to perform maintenance or do yard work. They use pressure tactics to push consumers into making a quick decision regarding their services in exchange for a "good deal," but the work is often never completed or poorly done.



Secure your home

Aside from the front door, make sure all other entry points of your home are secured. A known tactic of some scammers is to distract the person who answers the door so that an accomplice can get inside. Close and lock all windows and doors, including the garage door.

Ask for ID

In Fairfield, solicitors must receive permission in the form of a permit from the Fairfield Police Department. City Solicitor's Permits will show the name and picture of the solicitor, their business name and a permit expiration date. Solicitors are required to wear permits at all times.

Do not allow entry

Another trick solicitors may use to get inside your home is to offer a free appraisal or inspection. Do not allow strangers into your home for any reason. All criminal trespassing laws still apply to registered solicitors.

Buyer beware

Do not take solicitors at their word. For your protection, ask solicitors to put every thing in writing. Instead of making a quick decision, tell solicitors you want time to review their services. Do your research on solicitors' reputations and consult with someone you trust, or the police, if you are unsure.

Know your rights

Per the Ohio Revised Code (1345.21), solicitors must provide a three-day cancellation form, which gives consumers three business days to cancel contracts or orders for the sale of most goods sold outside the seller's regular place of business. This applies to door-to-door sales.

If you have questions, concerns or feel uncomfortable about the behavior of a solicitor in Fairfield, do not hesitate to contact the Fairfield Police Department online or by phone at 513-829-8201. In an emergency, dial 911.

Route 4 and Michael/Camelot Intersection Realignment

Construction will begin this spring to improve the Route 4 and Michael/Camelot intersection. In 2017, due to its crash history and poor design, this intersection was identified as a potential recipient of state safety funding. The City engaged a consultant to assist with the application process, which ultimately resulted in \$1.37 million awarded in 2018 to cover engineering, right of way, and construction. Engineering was completed in 2020 followed by right of way acquisition in 2021. Construction bids were opened in December 2021 and Barrett Paving Materials was the low bidder at \$1,335,439.34. Duke and other utilities have been moving their infrastructure ahead of the City's project.

The purpose of the project is to better align Michael and Camelot across Route 4 from one another, similar to the 2016 improvement to realign Holden and South Gilmore at Route 4. The project will include new curb, sidewalk, storm sewer, pavement, and a rebuilt traffic signal that will feature Fairfield's first flashing yellow arrow. Also included in this project is the replacement of 600 feet of water main, which is partially funded by a federal community development grant.

Detours will be necessary for much of the project. Traffic will be able to turn off of Route 4 onto both streets, but motorists on either Michael or Camelot will be required to follow detours to access Route 4. The project is expected to wrap up by the end of the 2022 with the majority of traffic disruption happening this summer while schools are on summer break.

Troubleshooting High Utility Bills

To begin troubleshooting, you may start by answering these questions:

- Have you used water for outdoor purposes, such as a pool fill, watering your lawn/landscape, or power washing?
- Have you had guests staying in the home or recently increased the number of people living in the home?
- Are there any fixtures, such as a faucet or outside spigot, that have a slow drip or leak?
- Has your water softener been stuck cycling water? Occasionally water softeners will get stuck in the backwash or rinse mode, and will continue to cycle water through the unit until the problem is corrected.
- Do you have a leaking toilet? Toilets are the most common cause for higher utility bills because they are a silent culprit - you may not notice that they are running, because the running water may not be seen or heard. See the section below for information on testing for a leaking toilet.



Toilet Dye Test

1. Drop a dye tablet or a few drops of household food coloring into the back tank of the toilet. **Don't Flush!**

**Dye tablets are available FREE OF CHARGE at the Utility Billing Collections Office.*

2. Check the *bowl* water every 10-15 minutes for an hour. If color appears in the bowl, you have a toilet leak that will need repaired. TIP: If you have a toilet leak, you can use the shut off valve behind the toilet until repairs can be made.

Water Meter Leak Detection

1. Make sure that no water is being used inside the home.
2. On your water meter, locate the leak detector (black triangle, red triangle, or small dial on the face of the meter). If no water is being used, the leak detector should not be moving. If the leak detector is moving, water is passing through the meter indicating that there is a leak.
3. If the leak detector is not moving, make a note of the meter reading (write down all digits.) Check the meter again after an hour (still making sure that no water is used inside the home during the entire hour). If any of the digits have changed, then there is a leak.
4. Locate the source of the leak and make repairs.

New Lane on I-275 Ramp

Since last fall, Barrett Paving Materials, the City's contractor, has been working to complete a new lane from southbound South Gilmore onto westbound Interstate 275. Construction was paused in December when temperatures dipped below the optimal range for final paving. Temporary pavement was installed to allow for the lane to be opened to traffic. Crews are scheduled to return this summer to finish the final paving which will require some ramp closures.

Identified as an important improvement to the South Gilmore corridor by an early 2000s study, this ramp was initially planned as part of the 2010 South Gilmore project, but ultimately was not able to be incorporated into that construction.

In 2017, the City was awarded construction funding through a federal Congestion Mitigation and Air Quality (CMAQ) grant and the Butler County Transportation Improvement District chipped in to fund engineering with a Jobs and Commerce grant. The contract with Barrett is worth \$726,331, of which 80% is covered by the federal grant.







Smart Water Meters – Coming Soon!



Fairfield's Public Utilities Department recently awarded a contract for the replacement of all 13,000+ water meters in the City. Most existing meters in the City are well over 20 years old and are near the end of their useful life. All the new meters will be "smart" meters provided by Master Meter – which will give water customers access to real-time usage information. Among other things, customers will be able to see hourly water usage rates, get alerts for possible leaks, and set alarm thresholds for high usage – all through a simple smart phone app. Meter readings will be collected automatically – twice daily – through a licensed radio transceiver system called Harmony - Allegro.

The City's contractors for this project are Ferguson Water Works and Professional Meters Inc. (PMI). As most of the water meters in Fairfield are located inside homes or businesses – often in basements – the contractors will need inside access to perform their work. Letters, door hangers, and social media posts will be used to communicate with customers to schedule appointments so that meters can be replaced.

Project FAQs:

- **What will this cost me?** Nothing. There is no cost to the customer for the new meter.
- **Do I need to do anything now?** No. At a later date you will receive a letter providing instructions on how and when to schedule a service appointment.
- **When will this happen?** The contractors will start installing new water meters in May or June 2022. It is expected the project will take 10-12 months to complete.
- **What if my meter is inaccessible or blocked?** City code requires that your water meter be accessible at all times. If your meter is obstructed, please make immediate arrangements to clear the obstructions.
- **How long will the service technician be in my home?** A typical meter change-out takes about 20 minutes.
- **Can I opt out of this?** No. All water meters in the City must be replaced. The existing meters will not work with the new meter reading system.
